...on my first year

One of my missionary brothers recently asked me about my thoughts on my first year as a missionary. I sat there in silence because I hadn't really reflected about my first year – it has gone by so fast. Two things I know: I am where God wants me to be, and this community of men and women have become my family.

For those of you who don't know me, I am the former district manager of Hancock Fabrics. I started working for Hancock Fabrics as a sales consultant in the Northern Virginia area in 1984. I managed several stores in the Northern Virginia and Richmond, Va. area. The opportunity arose to move back "home" with the opening of a Hancock store in Tonawanda. The rest, they say, is history – my involvement started as a FOSL and Associate Lay Servant of Divine Mercy with St. Luke's. The Lord has been calling me to become a missionary for several years; I just wasn't listening until the day I lost my job with Hancock Fabrics due to a restructuring process...that day was January 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2006. On February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2006 I moved to the Mission and on April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2006 I made my simple promises as a Lay Missionary of Divine Mercy. I saw the hand of God in all of that – His protection, His love, and His mercy.

I now reside at the Queen of Peace House with two other missionaries: Elaine Schmitt and Teresa Mayer. As a women's residence, it also is the home of three other women. My duties are many and varied (as are all the missionaries). I work in the sacristy on a daily basis, shuttle a group of children to Kolbe Catholic School on a daily basis, help set up for Generations of Faith program, to name a few duties. I am part of the team that accompanies the Voices of Mercy on ministry to sell the CD's and other religious articles. That is a double joy for me as it allows me not only to meet some very beautiful people at the ministry but it also allows me to either hear Amy and Norm speak or to participate in a healing mass.

The work is plentiful, the hours long, but the rewards are great. Sharing a smile, word of encouragement, a hug with someone means just as much to me (if not more) as to he or she with whom I am sharing it. It is not about what can you do for me, but what can I do for you. I could not do this work or live here without God's love, protection, and mercy. I think that's the greatest lesson I've learned during the year.

In a message to "Anne" (a "Lay Apostle" whose book I am now reading) received from Jesus, "So today, concentrate on My continual presence. Ask Me what I would like you to do. Ask Me what words I would like you to use. Then listen to My answer. My Spirit will speak to you and you will hear the words, resting upon your soul."
