Moreno celebrates Spanish mass once a month and his wife Evelyn is teaching the faith to three of the ladies. We are so blessed because many members of these families will be baptized, and or brought farther in the faith by receiving their first communion and confirmation during our Easter Vigil. We just never know who the Lord will bring to us next. We stay open to His call.

Another change that will have a direct effect on the Mission is the cancellation of our annual St. Joseph's Day table. St. John Maron's is renovating their hall and unavailable. 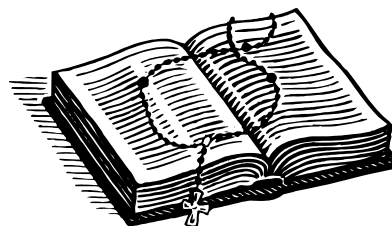

Revealed to St. Faustina as a prayer for mercy desired by our Lord, the devotion has become an important and beloved prayer in our Church. Great promises have been made to those who pray the Chaplet, as recorded in St. Faustina's Diary:

*Encourage souls to say the Chaplet which I have given you (Diary, 1541). Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death (Diary, 687). When they say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just Judge but as the Merciful Savior (Diary, 1541). Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy (Diary, 687). I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My mercy (Diary, 687). Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will (Diary, 1731).*

### Holy Thursday

9PM.....**Easter Vigil**

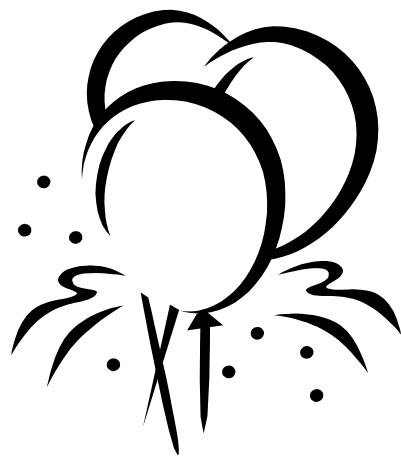

### From St. Faustina's Diary:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My Inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. **The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment.** [our emphasis] On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will I contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy. (Diary 699)

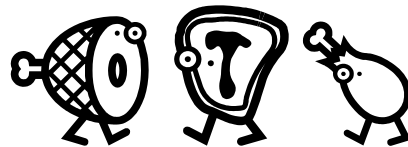

# "Praise the Lord!"

"Praise and exalt Him above all forever." (Daniel Chapter 3). For who is like unto God, or who has known the mind of God. It's around midnight and things are kind of quiet. It's very cold out tonight but we're warm here inside what used to be the convent, a structure that was built and dedicated to God to further the work of the Kingdom of God. Its original purpose was, of course, to house a group of Felician nuns, a group of women who took sacred vows to serve God, to dedicate their lives to God; they certainly have done many good works. Tonight, as I gaze down the length of the fifty-foot hallway I find myself reflecting on how things have changed, and there is wonder in it all for me.

In my mind's eye I can see the nuns coming in and out of their bedrooms, getting ready to begin their busy day. I imagine the hallway looked much different then, very neat and orderly, perhaps a statue or two of a saint or maybe the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The fresh scents of recently mopped floors and cleansers used in the bathrooms and linens fresh from the laundry fill the air. The polite sounds of intermittent conversation are heard; "Good morning, Sister Anne," "Oh, good morning to you, too." Everyone would eventually find their way down to the chapel for prayer or perhaps Mass; a busy bee-hive of brown habits where coordinated activities give a sense of order and unity flavored with a feeling of holiness.

Finally my imaginary daydream begins to fade and my eyes begin to come into focus, shifting from a hallway that was to a hallway that is. It's quite a different hallway. The rooms are filled and the length of the hallway floor is lined with men wrapped up in a hodge-podge array of blankets from one end to the other and on both sides. The spaces between the men are dotted with plastic garbage bags containing their meager belongings. It doesn't smell very good and sometimes the words exchanged would've made the old nuns turn beet red and gasp! Each man is unique and yet they all share

something in common. They have all suffered somehow. Some have been wounded in love, and some have been wounded in hatred. Some have a sense of purpose and keep themselves busy, while some seem to wallow in the mire of a vague existence where true purpose seems perpetually elusive.

There is wonder in it all for me. The disheveled hobo who seems lost in the chaos of society and the dedicated nun so singular in purpose. Both have lived here. Both have walked these hallowed halls. Each one was conceived with an everlasting love in the eternally sacred mind of God before He even formed them in their mother's womb. We are all called to be Christ-like. Its easy to see Christ in a person who has led a life of prayer and service to God. What do we see when we look at the dirty, broken mess of men scattered across the hallway floor? Jesus said, "When I was homeless, you sheltered Me." Who has known the mind of god or who is like unto God? Praise and exalt Him above all forever. Amen.

## Health Fair Begins Project Safety Net!

A huge Health Fair on January 28<sup>th</sup> inaugurated "Project Safety Net", St. Luke's program funded by the Fidelis Care Diocesan Grant Fund to identify and link with caregivers those in our community who have been diagnosed with diabetes, high blood pressure, asthma, mental illness and pregnancy whose medical conditions are not being managed by a physician or other caregivers. Volunteer presenters from Mid-Erie Mental Health, The American Diabetes Association, Sisters Hospital, The Visiting Nurses Association, D'Youville Student Nurses Association, Erie County Health Department TB Program and St. Luke's own Our Lady of Good Remedy Clinic were present for nearly two hundred participants from the community. Everyone who participated received a gift of toiletries and personal items, and the kitchen provided a great meal to boot.

The Health Fair, a part of the identification phase of the program, yielded vital information about who needs continuing medical care in our community. Our next phase is to invite those needing care to information nights, complete with a delicious dinner and a great speaker, and to make the important referrals to caregivers.

Our next Health Fair is scheduled for June 17<sup>th</sup> 2006, complete with an outdoor bar-b-cue! See you there!

# The Convocation of Unity

"Unity is of the essence of the Church." (CCC: 813)



The Convocation of Unity is a monthly gathering of priests and lay members of the diocese for a period of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament – a diocesan Holy Hour! It is held the First Friday of each month at St. Joseph's Cathedral from 2PM to 4PM. St. Luke's wholeheartedly supports this wonderful endeavor and encourages everyone to make every effort to attend.

The purpose of the Convocation is to offer reparation and prayers for our priests, our Church, and our world. In his apostolic letter written for the Year of the Eucharist, Pope John Paul II wrote: "Let us take time to kneel before Jesus present in the Eucharist, in order to make reparation by our faith and love for the acts of carelessness and neglect, and even the insults which Our Savior must endure in many parts of the world."

The first hour, 2PM to 3PM, is for reparation for our sins. The second hour, 3PM to 4PM, is the hour of Great Mercy. Prayers of reparation, music interspersed with time for quiet meditation or reading of Scripture, the Divine Mercy Chaplet and Benediction will be a part of this time with Jesus. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available during the Hour of Mercy.

It is certainly a sacrifice to make time to attend – for any or all the prayer time – yet during these times of great strife great sacrifice is required. Those who are physically able are encouraged to fast until 4PM. In seeking to overcome the evil that has plagued our Church over the last several years we can receive guidance from Matthew 17:21 – after asking Jesus why they were unable to expel a demon, the apostles were told, "This kind does not leave without prayer and fasting."

Pope John Paul II of happy memory said, "Time given to Christ is never time lost, but is rather time gained, so that our relationships and indeed our whole life may become more profoundly human."

May the Convocation of Unity be a profound blessing for our diocese!

## The Queen of Peace House

Three years ago Elaine Schmitt was an associate with some struggles in her personal life. In the midst of these struggles Elaine could see the blessings and decided to thank God for His goodness by making some changes in her life. She was divinely inspired to take a Mission-owned house, fix it up and give it back to God as a gift.

There were many houses to choose from. Elaine picked one just a couple doors down from the Mission, and the work began. Through the help of volunteers such as her dear friend Jeannie, her own personal finances and generous donations, she was able to proceed with the renovations. There were many problems, the worst being a caved-in ceiling due to water damage. Elaine moved in before it was completed so that she could work on the house as much as possible. (Shortly thereafter, in April of 2005 Elaine made her promises as a missionary). When she first moved in it was a two-family home, with an occupant in the upstairs apartment. After the upstairs tenant moved out she continued her renovations and changed the dwelling into a single family home. By now the house was becoming a "true" home with a name of its own: in honor of her conversion in 1999 in Medjugorje, Elaine decided to call it the "Queen of Peace" house. What made this home really special was that her workers were often the guys who lived in the shelter at the convent. They were drawn in by Elaine's love and respect for them. Like a "spiritual den mother" she would gather her "boys" and sit on the front porch to pray with them. Many times in warm weather you might drive by the Queen of Peace house and see the guys sitting on her front porch, talking and drinking the coffee that brews continuously for them. They are always respectful and follow a few simple rules that Elaine has set up for the house.

At first Elaine lived alone in the home but was soon joined by Molly, who helps run the kitchen at the Mission and who had been living on the first floor of the convent. Then came Tiffany and Mady. At

Christmas time, Teresa Mayer, another missionary, moved in to help Elaine. In early February, Joanne Heimiller, who is an associate discerning a call to the promises of Missionary life, also joined the household.

Right before Christmas the Queen of Peace house took in a refugee family deported from Canada. Dropped on our doorstep was an eight-and-a-half month pregnant mom, her four children and their grandmother. The house had its very own Christmas baby when Nathaniel David was born on December 20th. Shortly after, adequate housing was found for the family and they have become active members of the Mission who will be coming into the Catholic faith this Easter.

A second family of six arrived at the same time as Joanne, and they were housed until suitable arrangements could be made for them as well. Elaine has become an expert at furnishing houses for families!

Two more young women were added to the group early this winter. One has since moved, but the house remains open for whomever the Lord will send!

Elaine's vision for the home is still not complete. Renovations continue, and progress is being made every day. Elaine envisions gardens with fresh vegetables to help feed the community, and looks forward to expanding her yard as adjacent properties become available.

The Queen of Peace house has also hosted missionary gatherings and has become a place of welcome and hospitality. Hot breakfast sandwiches are often served from the front door, and many a cold wanderer has received a steaming cup of coffee. Not even Elaine could have imagined the important role the Queen of Peace House would play in the community surrounding St. Luke's, as a beacon of light in the darkness. It is a haven, a place of rest, and a center of peace.
